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£1.2 Million For Projects In Lewes District ———

Projects in the Lewes district are to benefit from £1.2 million allocated through Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding.

CIL is a charge local authorities can make on new developments to raise funds for the improvement of roads, sports, school and medical facilities, open spaces and flood defences.

Over £5 million has been collected since the scheme came into force in December 2015. The money is shared between county, district and community initiatives.

In this round of district funding allocations, £20,000 will go towards improvements at the Salts Recreation Ground in Seaford and £56,000 will help deliver resurfacing on the tennis

courts and ball court in Newhaven Fort Recreation Ground, and ramped access to the venue.

A further £13,280 will establish a electricity supply to the Denton Island bandstand in Newhaven and nearly £3,000 will part-fund three water refill stations on Seaford seafront to reduce the use of single-use plastics.

Councillor Emily O'Brien, Cabinet Member for Planning, said:

"CIL funding is proving a real gamechanger in our local communities, with health, wellbeing and social benefits being generated.

"The improved sports facilities in this round of funding is great news and I'm particularly pleased to see the major

funding being committed to the cycle route from Newhaven to Piddinghoe."

Some £250,000 from the combined county and community pots will partfund the construction of 1.5km of cycle way alongside the River Ouse, known as the Egrets Way Project.

The Seahaven Academy will also receive £400,000 from the county allocation to support expansion of the school and £300,000 has been agreed for improvements to the Newhaven ring road.

The community pot has also earmarked £3,000 towards the refurbishment of the school library in Newick – the project will create a resource hub that people living in the village can use free of charge.



Lewes District Lottery Is Launched

Lewes District Council has launched a new online lottery to support local good causes.

With a weekly jackpot of £25,000 up for grabs, tickets cost just £1 with 60p going towards local good causes, compared to just 28p in the pound for the National Lottery. There are also prizes of £2,000, £250. £25 or three free tickets.

Councillor Ruth O'Keeffe, Cabinet Member for Tourism and Devolution, said:

"The council already supports good causes through our grant funding and with the launch of the Lewes District Local Lottery even more voluntary and charitable groups in the district will benefit.

"The first draw on December 14 gave an early Christmas present to lucky lottery players. Good luck to everyone who takes part, whatever the time of year."

Any groups in the district that want to take advantage of the

All those approved by the council will have their own page on the website and can encourage their supporters to support them when they take part in the lottery.



Seaford Skate Park Is Taking Off —

Seaford's new skate park has proved a big hit with skateboarders, BMXers, mountain bikers and scooter riders who are making superb use of the facility throughout the winter evenings thanks to floodlights.

The four floodlights stay on until 9pm every night and were installed in October, enabling skate park users to make the most of the darker nights. CCTV has also been set up to ensure the skate park, at The Salts Recreation Ground, is a safe place for users of all ages.

The skate park, designed and built by the company Canvas, opened in the summer. It was developed by Seaford Town Council using Section 106 funds, a generous donation from NPS Lions and a Sports England grant. A new water station has also been installed at the venue to encourage people to refill bottles there and stop the pollution caused by single-use plastics.

It is the first of four water refill stations to be put in place by Seaford Town Council, with three more planned for along the promenade. The town council's restaurant, The View at Seaford Head, also offers free water refills to visitors.

At The Front Line Of Fighting Climate Change

Lewes District Council has appointed a new Strategy and Partnership Lead for Sustainability to drive forward a programme of far-reaching action.

Kate Richardson will join the authority later this month from her current role at East Sussex County Council.

The appointment is just one of many steps the new Co-operative Alliance is taking to achieve zero carbon emissions and full climate resilience by 2030.

The news follows Cabinet approval for a pesticide reduction policy and strategy for pollinator-friendly land management.

Lewes District Council will now use non-pesticide options for weed control as a first choice whenever possible – the authority was amongst the first to pioneer the use of hot foam. The technique works by applying heat to the weed in the form of hot water and foam. The near boiling point of the mixture acts as a thermal blanket, keeping the heat on the weed long enough to kill it.

A strategy has also been agreed that changes the council's approach to land management, putting a much greater focus on pollinators and the critical importance of their role in the food chain.

Professor Dave Goulson, Professor of Biology at the University of Sussex, said:

"It is vital that we do more to look after our declining pollinators, so I am delighted to see Lewes District Council's new strategy to reduce pesticide use and increase habitat for these most important of creatures."

Councillor Zoe Nicholson, Leader of Lewes District Council, said:

"We have a raft of measures already underway and others soon to be implemented."

Other climate actions
planned by the Co-operative
Alliance include an annual
report to the Audit and Standards
Committee on the level of council
investment in the fossil fuel industry
through its pension plan, the formation of a
Community Climate Change Forum attended by
some of the world's leading experts in the field, new
measures to ensure young people are part of the climate
emergency decision-making process and the setting up of
a Climate Change Scrutiny Panel to monitor and oversee
the implementation of the strategy.

Councillor Nicholson added:

"In the three months since I became leader, my team and I have been working as fast as possible to turn the national and international momentum around tackling climate change,



underpin the declaration with measures designed to achieve our overarching goals of zero emissions and climate resilience by 2030.

"I'm pleased with the progress made so far, but we have much more to do, and we will not rest until we have achieved every one of our goals."

New Council Homes In Newhaven

The first tranche of new homes has been completed in Lewes district through Aspiration Homes, the council's development company.

Aspiration Homes has brought forward five threebedroom affordable houses out of the new Trinity Homes development of 27 homes on the former Grays School site in Western Road, Newhaven.

Out of the five, four homes are for rent and are being made available through Lewes District Council's housing register and one home is being offered under shared ownership for households who want to purchase part of their own home.

The ambition is to deliver 215 new homes through Aspiration Homes across Lewes and Eastbourne by 2021/22.

Councillor William Meyer, Cabinet Member for Housing, said:

"There is a real need for three-bedroom family homes in the district so I'm particularly delighted with this development.

"Monthly utility bills will be reduced thanks to solar panels on each property and they also have a high specification of insulation, ensuring heat is retained and utility bills are reduced."

The development is within walking distance of the town centre and local schools and, with nearby bus stops, there is easy access to Brighton and other neighbouring towns.

Councillor Meyer added: "The delivery of high quality homes for those who need them most is a top priority for the Co-operative Alliance.

"The acute shortage of affordable homes is a challenge for every local authority. Here across the Lewes district we are using a mix of development options to increase our housing supply for residents. The Alliance's overriding aim being to bring forward many more such innovative schemes over the next four years."



Housing Fraud

Lewes District Council is cracking down on housing fraud which deprives people in need from having a home.

Housing fraud takes many forms, including:

- Subletting without permission
- Giving the wrong information upon application
- Not telling the council upon leaving the property
- Not telling the council when someone else has left the property or passed away – 'fraudulent succession'
- Fraudulent right to buy applications
- · 'Key selling'

Punishments include losing the home, a maximum fine of £50,000 and a criminal conviction.

Addison Act Centenary



This year marks the centenary anniversary of the 1919 Addison Act which saw the start of large-scale social housing in the UK. Christopher Addison was a gifted surgeon who entered politics and later became the Minister for Health. He recognised that good housing had a direct link to health and wellbeing, and as a result he guided the new Housing Act through Parliament.

Helped by the Addison Act, the council purchased 39 acres of land from the Marquess of Abergavenny for £2,312 on 5 November 1920. Some 14.5 acres of this land was approved by a government inspector for subsidy and soon after the first council houses in the area were built on Nevill Road.

EU Settlement Scheme

EU citizens and their families can apply to the EU Settlement Scheme to continue to live, work and study in the UK.

Applicants must be a citizen of the EU, Iceland, Lichtenstein, Norway or Switzerland, or a non-EU family member of an EU citizen. This includes those with a UK permanent residence document.

People do not need to apply if they have indefinite leave to remain or enter, or are an Irish citizen – but they can do if they wish.

I am a Building Control Surveyor (Specialist Advisor) with the Building Control team. We provide a professional service to architects, homeowners and builders which includes checking plans and carrying out site inspections to ensure a project achieves compliance with the building regulations set by central government.

We offer advice and support based on a local knowledge of ground conditions, building history, sewers and other considerations for the design and construction of buildings to guarantee they are safe, energy efficient and accessible for people to live, work and spend time in.

We are also called out to dangerous structures. In these cases we visit the site, advise on the course of action to remove the danger or reduce the risk and monitor the situation closely. Our number one priority is to keep the public safe at all times.

What is your biggest success?

My biggest success so far was last year when I graduated with a BSc in Historic Building Conservation. The Lewes district has a large, varied and interesting stock of historic and listed buildings, and our projects include a range of these buildings.

Having an understanding of traditional construction and a building's significance as well as what parts of the building regulations to apply to them is very important when making decisions. I enjoy being able to wear two hats in my job – achieving an appropriate balance between conserving the historic built environment whilst complying with building regulations to ensure the buildings are safe and efficient.
